The Vitalities Lab is a hub for interdisciplinary research that is lively, exciting, creative and novel. Under the leadership of SHARP Professor Deborah Lupton, the Vitalities Lab brings together researchers working on understanding human experience in the context of the more-than-human worlds in which they move and live.

The Vitalities Lab was launched by Deborah Lupton in February 2019, following her appointment to the Centre for Social Research in Health and the Social Policy Centre, Faculty of Arts & Social Sciences, UNSW Sydney. Other members of the team are postdoctoral fellows Dr Ash Watson (commencing July 2019), Dr Clare Southerton (commencing July 2019) and Dr Marianne Clark (commencing November 2019).




