# IN 2020 THE VITALITIES LAB TOOK OUR WORK ONLINE

In 2020 The Lab launched <u>our blog</u> and we've been regularly posting there about our projects, alongside guest posts from our visitors. We've covered a broad range of topics from <u>zine-making workshops</u> to <u>doctors dancing on TikTok</u> to <u>fitness practices during lockdown</u>. Some of our brilliant visiting scholars have also penned some great blogs for us. Katrine Meldgaard Kjær <u>reflected on the way COVID has shaped our perception of time</u>, as we experience 'waves' of viral outbreaks and second lockdowns. Vicki Harman <u>reflected on the judgements parents often face</u> when it comes to how their children use digital technologies. Jens Lindberg <u>wrote about how the pandemic reminds us</u> of the way that health systems are shaped by dominant ideologies that impact different groups unevenly. Megan Rose <u>reflected on the popularity of a video game</u> Animal Crossing: New Horizons, which has become a huge trend during the pandemic lockdown, with its cute characters and peaceful gameplay. We've also used the blog to document how our lives have shifted as the pandemic has unfolded. We've been reflecting on our <u>home workspaces</u> and our <u>daily experiences in lockdown</u>.



We also started our YouTube channel – <u>The Breaking Methods Webinar Series</u> in June 2020 and we've made 8 videos this year. This series of short-format webinars is designed to give an overview of 'breaking' methods.

The word 'breaking' is used in this context to refer to methods that are new and creative – 'breaking the mould' in some way. In each webinar, the presenter takes a case study approach. We use a 'voice-over' plus slides format and presenters give an account of a recent or current (work in progress) empirical research project, explaining how and why they used the method.

Our channel has over 1000 subscribers and our videos have been viewed over 10 000 times. We've covered a wide range of methods so far including the <u>Story</u> <u>Completion method</u>, <u>digital diaries</u>, <u>zine-making</u> and <u>analysing YouTube videos</u>.

- The completed storyboards and recorded discussions are the research materials for analysis


# Acceptance of autonomous vehicles and potential impact on active transport (Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council): 2020-2022

\$61,778 awarded to John C. Spence, Marianne Clark and Ryan Rhodes.

As automated vehicles become a more likely part of our daily landscapes, this two-stage project examines the acceptance of autonomous vehicles and their potential impact on active transport (e.g., walking, cycling) among residents of the United Kingdom, United States, and Canada. This project also explores Canadians' anticipations, expectations and imaginaries of autonomous vehicles in relation to their daily modes of getting around.

# Shifting intimacies: navigating the game of mobile dating (Marsden Fund, New Zealand) 2021-2024

\$300, 000 (NZD) has been awarded for this project on which **Deborah Lupton** is second associate investigator, with Professor Antonia Lyons and principal investigator Dr Ally Gibson, Victoria University of Wellington, NZ.




